Course Objectives

- Technique
 - Use vibrato and balanced motion to create beautiful tone in our performance pieces.
 - Increase speed in playing 3 octave scales.
 - Developing an orchestral sense of intonation.
 - Utilize many orchestral bowings, including:
 - Spicatto (multiple kinds)
 - Sautille
 - Martele
 - Brush stroke
 - Ricochet
 - Others as needed
 - Increase facility in both the left and right hand
 - Developing efficient and effective practice habits.
- History and Theory
 - Establish a firm understanding of basic music theory to enhance our performances.
 - Using our understanding of form and structure to inform our performances.
 - Understanding the history and context of our repertoire to better communicate the heart and intention of the composers through our performances.
- Performing and Responding to Music
 - Develop an appreciation for quality musical performance.
 - Examine what music is and how it communicates profound human emotions.
 - Learning how to listen to music to gain more insight and enjoyment from it.

Grading Policies:

Your grade in this class will be determined from the following categories:

- 30% Practicing and Participation
- 30% Formative Playing Assessments
- 20% Summative Playing Assessments
- 10% Written Quizzes and Reflection Assignments
- 10% Written Final Exam

Practicing and Participation (30%)

Practicing: practicing accounts for 15% of your grade. At the end of each quarter, you will turn in a practice report indicating how many minutes you practiced and what your practicing goals were that quarter.

Participation: this category accounts for 15% of your grade and includes your attitude and participation in rehearsals and includes the level of preparation, respect, punctuality, attitude, and focus you bring to the orchestra room every day. This category also includes concert attendance. An unexcused absence from a dress rehearsal or concert will result in an automatic zero in the participation category.

Formative Playing Assessments (30%)

Playing quizzes function as formative assessments. Formative assessments help students monitor their progress towards mastery of learning targets and help identify areas for additional growth. Our playing quizzes cover scales, technique, and repertoire. I will give at least one week of notice before a playing quiz. If you miss a playing a quiz, you are responsible for setting up a time with Mr. Sawyer to make up that quiz. Missed quizzes that are not made up within one week will be entered into the gradebook as a zero. Students will be allowed to retake a playing quiz one time if they wish to raise their grade; quiz make-ups must be scheduled with Mr. Sawyer outside of class and sectional time. Playing quizzes occur in one of four formats: as part of a testing group, individually in front of the class, individually in Mr. Sawyer's office, or as a video uploaded to Mr. Sawyer's google drive.

Summative Playing Assessments (20%)

A summative assessment is a culminating assessment that measures a student's understanding of a group of learning targets. We will have 2-3 summative assessments each semester covering scales and repertoire.

Written Quizzes, Written Assignments, and Reflection Assignments (10%)

There will be several written assignments throughout the year. Many of these will be through the google classroom. Written assignments will cover music theory, history. Additionally, we will have reflection assignments in which we discuss the music we are performing as well as our progress as an orchestra.

Written Final Exam (10%)

During our final exam period, you will take a written final exam covering aspects of music history and theory we discussed throughout the semester.

Recommended Equipment for Daily Success in Orchestra

- 1. Instrument and bow in good playing condition:
 - a. Strings should be no more than two years old.
 - b. Bow has been rehaired within the last two years.
 - c. Pegs working smoothly and easily.
- 2. Rosin
- 3. Soft Cleaning Cloth
- 4. Pencil!
- 5. Shoulder Pad (Violin/Viola), Rock Stop (Cello/Bass)
- 6. 1" Three Ring Binder (hard cover that will stay open on a music stand)
- 7. Five binder dividers to be labeled in this order:
 - a. Technique
 - b. Practice Parts
 - c. Theory/History
 - d. Playing Assessments
 - e. Other

Tardiness and Absence

Varsity Orchestra meets 2nd hour from 8:50-9:40 am. I realize that it takes time to get through the halls, get your instrument unpacked, and ready for rehearsal. As such, rehearsal will begin promptly at 8:52 am each day. The rehearsal agenda for the day will be on the whiteboard at the beginning of class; to save time make sure your music is in order *before* the rehearsal begins.

You are expected to be in your seat with your instrument and bow out, bow rosined, and music in order. The rehearsal begins with the concertmaster turning on an A to tune the orchestra. Any orchestra member who is not ready to play by 8:52 am will be marked as tardy, unless they have a pass from another teacher or the office.

Concert Dress

Women: Black standard concert orchestra dress, black shoes, black hose.

Men: Black tuxedo, long white tux shirt with a button cover, black socks, black dress shoes. All men and women are expected to wear black dress shoes; sneakers are not appropriate for concerts.

Savvi formalwear will be visiting SAHS on Thursday, September 8 to fit students for uniforms. Stay tuned for more details.

Music Policies

You will be assigned an orchestra folder to share with your stand partner. This folder contains the original copies of music we will be playing and will stay in the folder cabinet in the orchestra room at all times. When we travel, folders will travel in the SAHS folder box. Because we play standard orchestral literature, original copies of the music are *very* expensive and are often rented copies that we need to return.

You will be provided with photocopies of each piece will be performing. Each orchestra member will be required to maintain a three-ring binder in which practice copies will be kept. You are encouraged to keep your practice binder close by in order to mark in any changes that were made during rehearsal.

Any music issues, additional copies, etc. should be reported to the orchestra librarians.

Student Assistants

The orchestra needs a number of student aides to assist throughout the year. Most important are the positions of Music Librarian and Setup Crew. If you are interested in being a tremendous help to our orchestra program, please see Mr. Sawyer. If your class schedule allows, being a student assistant during the school day is very helpful.

Auditions for the 2017-18 Concert Orchestra

Auditions for next year's Concert Orchestra occur in April. This year's auditions are tentatively scheduled for April 10-14.

Audition packets will be made available in the orchestra room later this fall.

Private Lessons

If you are not taking private lessons, I STRONGLY encourage you to do so. Private lessons are a guaranteed way to make *enormous* improvements on your instrument quickly. Those taking lessons will receive extra credit. If you have questions or are interested in additional names and phone numbers please let me know. Lesson rates and instructional content will vary.

School Instrument Rentals (cello and bass)

Because of their difficulty in transportation, larger instruments are made available to students in the SAHS Orchestra Program for a rental fee. There is an \$80 usage fee for each instrument, which is used to cover the maintenance and repair costs associated with these instruments. Payments will be made using the SAHS FeePay system. Any damages due to improper care or negligence while in your possession will be charged to you.

We understand that this is a financial commitment for each orchestra family; please contact me if your situation prevents you from making this payment.

Con Amici Solo Competition

This year's Con Amici Solo Competition will be held on Wednesday, February 8 after school. The high school division of the competition is open to 10th and 11th graders. Youth Orchestra Opportunities

Minnesota Youth Symphonies (MYS)

The Minnesota Youth Symphonies (MYS) orchestral training program is modeled after the best music conservatories in the world with the goal of educating the whole musician. The orchestras perform 3 major concerts each season at prominent concert venues in the Twin Cities for audiences of over 4,000 classical music patrons, family and friends annually. All four MYS orchestras rehearse at Highland Middle School in St. Paul on Saturday mornings September through April.
